

Artist's Statement

Textile & Embroidery Fine Art

Inspired by nature's sublime beauty. I use paint and a needle as a versatile instrument to recreate our natural environment as an embroidery textile or I call "Painted Threads" I am looking to explore the transition from painting to textile with a combination of exposed and overlapping mixed medium. The movement between sewing and painting creates a balance between paint and threads. Landscapes are a constant theme in my work. Photos are the starting point and my sketches. I include all kinds of hand and machine stitches and often some elements of other fiber techniques such as dyeing, fusing, beading, cut and slashing the fabric. These are my tools to achieve my art. I studied textile design at RISD. I have worked in pattern design, repeat designs, weaving, screen printing, natural dyeing, printing just to mention a few. My mentors were my teachers, Aunt Nell, my father John H. Housley and step father Donald G. Paulhus.


Thoughts drifting and going in all different directions; scattered. Literally, sometimes I feel like am climbing up the wall.

This piece is a reverse appliqué quilt. Five layers of fabric cut away; revealing the fabric and colors below. The material consists of hand dyed cotton fabrics and commercial dyed fabrics. The wool and cotton yarn is twisted to create shapes and movement. Embroidery floss is hand sewn in organic shapes. This quilt is machine quilted in a loose design.

Education is the Ladder 12 x 15 NFS

This small quilt shows a blue ladder propped up against a pink wall that is partially topped with barbed wire. Each rung of the ladder is embroidered with one or two words from the phrase "Education is the ladder that scales the wall of ignorance." Our ignorance can prevent us from understanding and appreciating any number of subjects. It can also prevent us from making deeper connections with each other. This wall that divides us can be overcome when we ask simple questions and learn about each other. When we educate ourselves about our adversaries or attempt to fill the deficiencies in our knowledge, we can scale the wall of ignorance and explore new horizons.




